TORAH SELECTION: Genesis 32:4-36:43 Haftarah – Obadiah 1:1-21

### FROM THE RABBI

When most people think of Hanukkah, they think of it being a holiday celebrating religious liberty. Seldom is it pointed out that this is really a holiday that celebrates a victory of the Jewish people over our own weakness.

During the historical period of the Hanukkah story (160 BCE), we were a religion losing its staying power. The Jews were all too eager to embrace the pagan Greek ways and to forget their jewish customs. The Greek games, which had religious content, were extremely popular among the Jews. Jason, the High priest, was probably more Greek at heart than Jewish. The leaders of Judea were happy to become Greek in all ways and cast aside their ancient Jewish ways. Probably, the assumption of the Jewish leadership was that it was only a matter of time. Against this background, one of accepted assimilation, Antiochus issued his decrees to destroy Judaism. He believed the Jewish people would be all too willing to forget their faith. Though it is impossible to second guess history, Antiochus would probably never have tried to convert the Jews had he not been reassured by the Jewish leadership that Judaism was no longer paramount in their lives.

What do most people remember when they tell the story of Hanukkah? It is not the story of military victory, rather it is the miracle of the oil of the Temple burning for eight days, when it was only enough to burn for one. This symbol contains the real essence of Hanukkah. At a time when commitment to Judaism was waning, the flame of faith was still burning ever brighter among the faithful of Judaism.

Seeing the unwavering dedication and commitment of our President, Alan Goldberg, and our Board of Trustees, ensuring a glowing future for our congregation, I know differently. Seeing the devotion of our Religious School Director, Sam Small and our outstanding teachers to our Religious School, I know differently. Seeing the continuity of our regulars at Shabbat services, I know differently. Knowing and talking to you, our devoted and long-standing members, I know the flames are indeed burning bright and will only burn brighter in the years ahead for our beloved and historic congregation.

It all starts at Temple with regular Shabbat commitment, with regular Religious School commitment, with regular Jewish educational commitment, and with regular commitment to our Social Action programs. You can make a commitment and help to make the lights burn ever brighter.

Patti joins me in wishing you a happy and healthy Hanukkah. May the flames of this festive week light a renewed light for Judaism in your heart.

What are your congregation's greatest challenges?

- Participation through involvement and membership
- Finances

#### FROM OUR ARCHIVES

Last month an article in the Mobile Press Register listed Claiborne, Alabama, as one of seven "ghost towns" in the state.
Claiborne, situated 140 miles north of Mobile on the Alabama River in Monroe County, was originally incorporated in 1820. A busy, riverfront town, Claiborne was home to several businesses, stores, hotels, and homes. Among the 5,000 residents in the 1830s were several prominent Jewish families, many with connections to Jews in Mobile. Most were merchants, with one, Nathan Feibelman, serving as postmaster. Jewish families in Claiborne included the Jacobsons, Kleins, Levys, and Metzgers.

During the years leading up to the Civil War, Claiborne suffered through epidemics of yellow fever and cholera. At the end of the War the town was badly looted by Yankee soldiers. With large cotton plantations no longer in operation the town lost much of its river trade. At the turn of the century railroads bypassed Claiborne and most of the remaining citizens, including the

Jewish families, had left for Mississippi, north Alabama, or Mobile.

Today not much remains of the town, except for its three cemeteries. One of those is a small Jewish cemetery, which contains by different estimates anywhere from 30 to 100 graves. According to the tombstones, the earliest burial was in 1843 and the last in 1899. For many years the cemetery was badly neglected, overgrown with weeds and subjected to vandalism. In recent years several Jewish organizations have spent time cleaning up the graveyard and recording information about each grave. Most of the gravestones contain inscriptions in both Hebrew and English; some graves are missing markers, or the gravestones are difficult to read. The cemetery contains the remains of children, adolescents, and adults, many of whom had relatives in the Sha'arai Shomayim congregation of Mobile. Located on private property in a remote, isolated area of Monroe County, the cemetery is difficult to find and to access.

### HANUKKAH SERVICE FOR THE HOME

### THE FIRST NIGHT OF HANUKAH IS TUESDAY, DECEMBER 16

**Reader**: O God of Freedom and God of Justice! We glorify Thy holy name in this land of freedom and justice.

**Response**: We pray that these tiny candles may bring the light of blessing into our home and hearts.

BEFORE KINDLING THE LIGHTS, HOLD THE LIGHTED SHAMOS (HELPER CANDLE) IN YOUR HAND AND SAY OR SING THE FOLLOWING BLESSINGS:

Ba-ruch Attah Adonai, Elohaynu melech ha-olam a-sher kid' shanu b'mitzvotav, v'tzivanu, l'hadlik ner shel Hanukah.

Blessed art Thou O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who hast sanctified us by Thy Commandments and commanded us to kindle the lights of Hanukkah.

AFTER KINDLING THE LIGHTS, THE FOLLOWING IS RECITED:

Ba-ruch Attah Adonia, Elohaynu melech ha-olam she-a-sah nisim, la-a-votaynu, bayamim haheym bazman ha-zeh.

Blessed art Thou O Lord our God, King of the Universe, who performed miracles for our fathers in days of old, at this season.

THE FOLLOWING BLESSING IS RECITED ON THE FIRST EVENING ONLY:

Ba-ruch Attah Adonai, Elohaynu melechha-olam Sheh-he-cheyanu, v'key-mahnu, v'heegiyanu lazman ha-zeh.

### FROM OUR SHALIACH, ARAD LERNER



Shalom ya'll,

This month I would like to tell you a little bit about Hanukkah in Israel.

The atmosphere is set pretty early (like Christmas, here in the

United States). You see Soofganiyot, the Hanukkah donut, everywhere you go. It is a round pastry filled with jelly and covered with sugar. Its roundness is an indication of how you are going to look if you keep eating them and the temptation is huge, but it is definitely worth it. Of course, in the past few years the Soofganiyot has been upgraded and there are a variety of fillings and toppings.

All the symbols can be seen in the stores, on commercials, in packages, you name it. Candles, hanookiahs, gold coins, dreidels (sevivon), and cans of oil can be seen everywhere. (A Hanookiah is not a menorah - a menorah has seven canes, including the Shamash and a hanookiah has nine, including the Shamash). Usually, sales will use the magic number eight for the eight days of the holiday. Eight days that the miracle of the oil burned.

Invitations to light candles at night at your friends and families houses are given, which always involves food - Soofganiyot and levivot

(a type of pancake). Everyone sings songs around the candles and the atmosphere everywhere is always fun and happy.

As a kid, I really enjoyed Hanukkah, not just because of the presents and the great food, but also because the entire family would go to my grandma's house and have dinner and light the candles and sing together. Every year, we would mix up the words and laugh about making up new funny lyrics to sing in the songs.

Hanukkah is also the holiday for children's shows. The greatest of all is called the "FESTIGAL", which is a musical that changes themes every year and always has the coolest kids performing in it. When I was about ten years old, my aunt, who had no children at the time, took all of the smaller ones in the family to see this show. I had such a great time! Now, that she has children of her own, all of the cousins that she took to this musical as children have promised to pay her back by taking her children to see the "FESTIGAL". Hopefully, next year at this time, we can make it happen.

Until then, I would like to wish ya'll "Hanukkah sumeach" - Happy Hanukkah and also Merry Christmas.

I would also like to thank the Mobile Area Jewish Federation for bringing me here to Mobile.
