## COME JOIN US AT THE WEDNESDAY TORAH STUDY GROUP!



We are restarting our Wednesday Torah Study Group beginning on the first Wednesday in September at 5:30 p.m. We have a very animated and interesting discussion which runs until about 6:45 p.m. when much of the group moves down the street to the Dew Drop for a light and, not always, a completely healthy dinner.

Our approach to studying the Hebrew Bible is one that may surprise you, if you were not at any of our sessions last year. We begin with the text of the Hebrew Bible, but we bring in a variety of sources, ancient and modern, that help us to understand not only the literal meaning, but how it was interpreted by all sorts of different types of interpreters.

The documents that we look at show how a group of ancient Jewish interpreters dramatically change the meaning of the biblical text. Interpreters frequently explained biblical stories by retelling them in their own words, paraphrasing the biblical account, but also adding some of their own details of what happened and why. Some of these documents have been found among the Dead Sea Scrolls; with more than 900 ancient documents found in the Qumran area. Even though many of them were found in thousands of itsy bitsy pieces, scholars have done an amazing job of reconstructing them so that we can understand what they were trying to tell us.

One of my favorites is the Book of Jubilees, a scroll which contains a revelation given to Moses by the Angel of the Presence during the

revelation at Mount Sinai. What the scroll actually does is retell the Book of Genesis and the first part of Exodus. The most complete text in existence is only in Geez, a language from Ethiopia. The earliest version of the scroll to be found in modern times came from a monastery in that African country. Many decades after that discovery, fragments in Hebrew were found in the caves above the Dead Sea. There are many other fascinating scrolls that we can read excerpts from and see how they can give us new perspectives on familiar biblical stories.

For example, in the story of the Ten Commandments, we probably assume that God spoke all Ten Commandments to the entire assembly of Israel. But in the Midrash, which is a series of collections of various rabbinic stories, Rabbi Joshua explained that the Israelites actually only heard two commandments directly from God, “I am the Lord your God ...” and “There shall be no other gods beside me ...”, after that, the Israelites were so overwhelmed that they asked Moses to take the rest down and then convey it to them afterwards. That would explain why some rabbinic accounts reach 611 rather than 613.

In the story of Joseph and Potiphar’s wife, the rabbis were determined to portray Joseph as extraordinarily righteous. While she tried to tempt him, Joseph remained amazingly resilient and resistant. In this context, we can read an excerpt from the first book of Maccabees, which is an ancient book that was never lost, but which is not included in the Hebrew Bible. In Chapter 2 in the first book of Maccabees, Joseph is not only praised for resisting tremendous temptation, but it is given as the reason why he was able to become Prime Minister of Egypt. And I can’t resist going back to the Book of Jubilees, which we mentioned earlier, where Chapter 39 states that Potiphar’s wife tried to tempt Joseph for a year and a half, but he remained determined. And

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finally, when she grabbed on to his tunic, he broke the door of the house to run away from her leaving his tunic in her hand!

What I hope you can see from these few examples is that we can see the biblical text in new and sometimes amusing ways. At the same time, we can learn a great deal about translations and commentaries from different ancient documents that were either lost or forgotten for almost two thousand years.

We have a great time breaking down what the different excerpts say and what they might mean. Everybody who comes has their own interpretations, as well as religious views and it is a fascinating experience to see how these sources come to life in our very own Eichold Library. My name is Ofir Rozenberg and I arrived in Mobile on Friday, August 19th. It has been a pleasure to be here so far, feeling so welcomed and being treated so nicely by all the wonderful people

here. I am eagerly looking forward to meeting and getting to know all of you. And now for a short introduction.

I was born and raised in Israel 26 years ago. I grew up in a small community (which used to be a Moshav and currently is titled a Yeshuv Kehilati – a community settlement) in Galilee, just about 40 minutes from Haifa. Surrounded by nature and mountains, I used to spend my childhood afternoons biking, hiking, hanging out with friends outdoors, and developing a passion for photography (and an indescribable passion for foreign languages).

After graduating high school, I served as a squad commander in the Intelligence Unit of the IDF. I was in charge of new recruits, guiding and instructing them during their first month in the IDF. That was definitely an unforgettable experience.

About three years ago, I moved to the Upper Galilee to study social work in Tel-Hai Academic College. I am currently living on Kibbutz Ma'ayan Baruch which is located in the northern tip of Israel not far from Mt. Hermon, the Golan Heights, and the Jordan River. As a part of my social work studies, I was an intern in a local elementary school, nursing homes, and a regional school for children with special needs. In fact, as I am writing these lines, I am also writing my final papers and just about to graduate in a couple of weeks! How exciting is that?

Studying and living here, surrounded once again by the magical wonders of nature and wonderful people, has been an amazing experience. It is one of my dreams to return to this very specific area and build my future family here. But in the meantime, I want to share my love and passion for Israel with you.

Besides working and studying, I spent time backpacking in Nepal, South-East Asia, and Central America. Those were two different trips. I love traveling, meeting new people from different backgrounds and age groups, discovering new cultures, and combining it with my big passion for Israel – that is why I decided to go on this Shlichut! ## **FROM OUR ARCHIVES**

Last month's bulletin article concerned the beginnings of the Mobile section of the National Council of Jewish Women in 1896. The Temple Archives has an interesting collection of programs and brochures from this organization from the 1900s. During the early years of the twentieth century, the Mobile section helped with a variety of projects, including conducting sewing lessons for young girls, sponsoring English classes for newly-arrived immigrants, and regularly visiting and assisting Jewish patients in local hospitals.

Over the next 100 years, the Mobile section continued to be involved in multiple philanthropic endeavors in the city. During the Spanish American War, World War I, and World War II Council members assisted servicemen in port and helped resettle war refugees who arrived in Mobile. In the 1920s, members helped establish the Mobile Association for the Blind, providing funds for training materials, as well as volunteering as readers for the visually impaired. In the 1940s, the local section helped congregant Sam Eichold found the Diabetic Clinic, which was then located at the City Hospital, and Camp Seale Harris for diabetic children. The Council provided both funds and volunteers at these two sites.

In the 1950s, the Mobile section helped get legislation passed to establish Group Aid for Retarded Children, which provided educational opportunities for children with intellectual disabilities. Members funded a pilot program that eventually grew into Mobile Association for Retarded Citizens, now referred to as MARC.

In the 1960s and 70s, the Council helped fund a variety of community projects to assist disadvantaged and low-income children, such as the Mobile Terrace playground project and the Reading is Fundamental program.

In more recent years, Council projects have included funding for the Mobile Preschool for the Sensory Impaired, the Child Advocacy Center, senior citizen programs, and the building and staffing of a pediatric playroom at USA Medical Center. Projects were funded through a variety of fund-raising activities, such as casserole and bulb sales.

In March 1995, the Mobile section voted to disband, mainly due to declining membership. Council funds remained invested through a local community foundation until 2011, at which time they were disbursed to three local agencies providing a variety of services to children.

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
## **FROM THE MUSIC COMMITTEE**

**The History Museum of Mobile** will offer the exhibit, *Filming the Camps: From Hollywood to Nuremberg*, August 29, 2016 through January 16, 2017.

The exhibit is on loan from Mémorial de la Shoah. It features the stories of three film directors—John Ford, Samuel Fuller, and George Stevens—as they documented Nazi atrocities during WWII. ## **Challah Bread Pudding** *submitted by Liz Fry*

### **INGREDIENTS**

4 large eggs	4 cups day-old Challah, cut into all sizes (chunks/crumbs)
1 cup whole milk	1/2 cup pecans, toasted, chopped
1 cup whipping cream	
1/4 cup sugar	
1 teaspoon vanilla extract	
Pinch of salt	

Butter baking dish (8x8 or 9x13 or 8x12). Whisk first 6 ingredients in medium bowl. Place bread and pecans in prepared dish. Pour milk mixture over and let stand 5 minutes. Push down bread into custard. You can refrigerate 2 hours, pushing bread into custard occasionally – but I usually just bake it!

Preheat oven to 375°F. Place baking dish with bread pudding in large metal pan. Add enough boiling water to pan to come 1 inch up sides of dish with bread pudding. Bake until pudding is puffed and golden brown on top, approximately 45-50 minutes. Remove dish with bread pudding from water and cool slightly.

### **BOURBON SAUCE INGREDIENTS**

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) unsalted butter	1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons whipping cream	2 tablespoons bourbon
Pinch of salt	

Melt butter in small saucepan over medium heat. Whisk in remaining ingredients. Simmer until thickened, whisking often, about 3 minutes. Cool slightly.
