## A MESSAGE FROM OUR RABBI



***L'Shanah Tovah!  
A Good Year!  
A Year of Good Health!***

I can't believe that an entire year has come and gone and we are once again approaching the High Holy Days. It seems as if it was only a few months past that we were wishing one another this *Yontif* greeting. And yet, truly, "Thank God!" here we are again in a position to greet one another with *L'Shanah Tovah uM'tukah!*

With the first day of September we find ourselves simultaneously on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of the Hebrew month of *Elul*. This means we are 12 days into the 30 day count down leading up to the High Holy Days.

According to tradition, the month of *Elul* is a month of introspection that provides each of us the opportunity to look back on both the good and the bad that we have done during the past 11 months and then commit ourselves to doing a better job in the coming new year.

On the morning of *Rosh Hashanah*, it is customary to read or chant the opening verses from the Torah – the story of Creation. We begin our New Year with these verses as a reminder that the Holy One continually renews the Divine *Brit* (Covenant) by renewing all of Creation every day, every week, every month, and every year. But this *brit* is two-sided. We, too, have obligations incumbent upon us to fulfill our part of this covenantal agreement. Our world was not created to perfection. Imperfections do exist. Rabbinic tradition reminds us that God expects us to repair the imperfections that we can. We call this Divine obligation *tikkun olam* – "repairing the world." The *Pirkei Avot* states: "You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it (2:21)." Recently, Rabbi Jonah Dov Pesner, Director of the Religious Action Center, wrote in his blog: "Our world is imperfect. As Jews, we know this. The Torah teaches that God created a world capable of chaos and of order. While this can sometimes create moments of despair, it is also the basis for all hope, all light in the darkness."

How we approach the New Year and how we fulfill our obligations to Creation will have an impact on the way we contribute to the repair of this less than perfect world. My hope and prayer for the coming New Year is that it be filled with all of the Blessings of Creation for each of us and for all the world. May we be a source of light in the midst of those inevitable moments of darkness. May our efforts help restore our little part of an imperfect world. May we be inscribed in the Book of Life for blessing. And may we take every opportunity to celebrate life with our loved ones. Then, we will be able to say to one another:

*L'shanah Tovah uM'tukah!*

May this be a good and sweet New Year!

The Board recently approved the hire of Andy not only for the High Holy Days but for Shabbat services as well, as he had been providing help on a voluntary basis.

Our eyes and ears and emotional and spiritual selves are due to be enriched. Rabbi John Kaplan has stepped onto the scene by hitting the ground running with Shabbat services and providing guidance to our Religious School and other committees. We are fortunate to have him along with our talented musicians.

We realize the importance of providing worthwhile religious services. There is much more we will do. A full slate of programming is in the offing, including a concert to showcase the musical talents of Rabbi Kaplan, who is Cantor Emeritus at Temple Israel, the largest Temple in Tennessee. We are working on a variety of programs to inform you, entertain you and interest you. We are likewise excited by what the Religious School will provide our students as led by our dedicated and caring director, Patricia Silverman.

While we are mindful of the advice of public health experts in closing the Temple for in-person gatherings, I am reminded of the wise words of Rabbi Howard Kosovke, who served us so ably during his two years (slightly paraphrased): we have to be totally about the very people we serve and be completely relevant to our members' lives and needs. Zoom, it will be. We will continue to strive to fill in the rest for all of you to feel connected to Sha'arai Shomayim. L'shana Tova.

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## FROM OUR ARCHIVES

While skimming through Temple bulletins from the 1960s for an on-going research project, I have been continually struck by how often the old adage, “The more things change, the more they stay the same,” applies to Temple activities and issues. During April 1966, for example, Rabbi Irving Bloom discusses a questionnaire which had been distributed to all Temple congregants. Responses were received from 126 individuals. Rabbi Bloom reviews many of those responses in his weekly bulletin articles throughout the month. The 1966 answers may sound strikingly familiar to us in 2020.

One question regarded the Friday night Temple service. Suggestions respondents gave as to how the service could be improved included the addition of more “inspirational English prose and poetry” and more original prayers. Respondents felt the amount of Hebrew contained in the service was adequate and that a Cantor was not necessary for regular services. Rabbi Bloom noted that respondents “emphatically announced they were not interested in volunteering for choir service.”

Rabbi Bloom lists reasons respondents gave for not attending services. These included, “I guess I am just too lazy to get up and go;” “My husband seldom wants to go; I never like to leave him;” “I really haven’t any valid reason;” and “Lack of any real feeling for the need of public worship.”

Another question asked what could be done to make the Oneg Shabbat friendlier. These responses were interesting: “That is something I have wondered about for a quarter of a century;” “Rabbi should publicly introduce visitors in the auditorium;” “Greet newcomers;” “People should be warmer;” “Have Schnapps;” “Unfortunately in our congregation we have a number of social climbers and hypocrites;” “I think a few people ban together and exclude others;” and “I don’t know - this is up to the people - perhaps to smile and speak to all, instead of just their particular friends.”

Suggestions for improving services included the following: “Services tend to be too long;” “I enjoy them as they are;” “No congregational singing;” “More active participation by congregation in singing;” “Inject something humorous;” “Have a pipe organ comparable to our old one;” and “Each one of us should feel his responsibility.”

Rabbi Bloom concluded after reviewing these responses that “a reawakening of an inner need, a feeling of spiritual compulsion, is needed to impel our people to want to worship - to seek meaning in prayer. How this can be achieved is the ‘larger’ question which remains, I fear, unresolved.”

These articles reveal that Temple leaders have always grappled with such universal issues as making services more appealing to improve attendance. It seems that congregational responses have not changed that much over the years.

## **ROSH HASHANAH HOME SERVICE**

On **Saturday, September 19**, the Holy Day table should hold two candles, a cup of wine, two round challahs (baked especially for the New Year), a sliced apple and a dish of honey.

### **Before lighting the candles, the following blessing is read:**

With the setting of this evening's sun, united with Jews of every place and time, we proclaim a New Year of hope. Lord of the universe, let Your light and Your truth come forth to lead us. These flames we kindle are a symbol of Your eternal flame; may they open our eyes to the good we must do, moving us to work for harmony and peace, and so making the world bright with Your presence.

*Boruch Atah Adonoy Eloheynu Melach Haolam Asher Kid'shanu B'mitzvotav V'tsivanu L'hadlik Ner Shel Yom Tov.*

Blessed is the Lord our God, Ruler of the universe, by whose Mitzvot we are hallowed, who commands us to kindle the lights of Yom Tov.

*Boruch Atah Adonoy Eloheynu Melech Haolam  
She-he-che-yanu V'kiycmanu V'higiyanu Lazman Hazeh.*

Blessed art Thou O Lord, our God, King of the universe, who has kept us alive, preserved us, and enabled us to reach this season.

### **The following blessing for the wine is recited:**

*Boruch Atah Adonoy Eloheynu Melech Haolam Borey Piree Hagafen.*

Blessed art Thou O Lord our God, King of the universe, who has created the fruit of the vine.

### **ALL PARTAKE OF THE WINE**

One of the children dips a slice of apple in honey and says:

*Boruch Atah Adonoy Eloheynu Melech Haolam Borey Piree Haeyts.*

Blessed art Thou O Lord our God, King of the universe, who has created the fruit of the tree.

### **ALL PARTAKE OF THE FRUIT AND HONEY**

Another reads: "May it be Thy will, O Lord, our God, and God of our fathers, to renew us a sweet, happy and pleasant year."





## **YOM KIPPUR HOME SERVICE**

Yom Kippur, which begins **Monday, September 28**, is the one religious occasion which is observed almost entirely in the Temple. However, the meal which precedes the fast (Yom Kippur Eve) is meant to be a spiritual experience for the entire family.

### **MEMORIAL LIGHT**

It is customary to light a memorial light before we kindle the Yom Kippur candles. Holy day candles are kindled and the following blessings are recited:

*Baruch Atah Adonay Eloheynu Melech Haolam  
Asher Kidshanu B'mitzvotav V'tzivanu L'hadlik  
Ner Shel ShabbatVeshel Yom Ha-Kippurim.*

Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the universe, who has sanctified us by thy laws and commanded us to kindle the lights of Shabbat and Yom Kippur.

*Baruch Atah Adonoy Eloheynu Melech Haolam  
She-he-che-yanu V'kiyemanu V'higiyanu Lazman Hazeh.*

Blessed art Thou O Lord our God, King of the universe, who has kept us alive, preserved us, and enabled us to reach this season.

### **BLESSING THE CHILDREN**

It is a beautiful tradition before Kol Nidre for parents to bless their children by placing hands on each one.

For sons, say - "May God make you a true and faithful son of Israel, as were Ephraim and Menasseh, the sons of Joseph."

For daughters, say - "May God make you a true and faithful daughter of Israel, as were our mothers, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah."

At that time, too, members of the family ask each other for forgiveness for the hurts done, knowingly or unknowingly, during the year.
