# A MESSAGE FROM OUR RABBI

## “Season of Freedom”

**“In every generation, each person must regard himself or herself as if he or she had come out of Egypt (Haggadah)”.**



It won't be long when Jews all around the world will be sitting down with their families to join in the time-honored tradition of observing the Passover *Seder*. Truth be told, I can't wait. I love the rituals, the music, the food, and,

most of all, the family. Of course, like last year, family *seders* are going to be a little different. For some, it will be filled with loneliness instead of family. For many, their *seder* will be limited to an online experience. And yet, still we observe the traditions.

And why do we do this? According to the *Haggadah* (literally “The Telling”), in each generation we remind ourselves and our children that we were once slaves in Egypt. By retelling the story, we bring ourselves closer to the story and, thereby, closer to the Jewish people. Fortunately, we have not experienced slavery in recent generations; but, we remember and retell the story so that we can

acknowledge that freedom is such a tenuous gift. This tenuous gift is such a fragile thing. If but one generation forgets, then that generation will lose that freedom. It can, if not properly cared for in each generation, simply dissolve like the mist and wither away.

Every year at Passover I am reminded of the famous words of George Santayana, “Those who forget history are condemned to repeat it.” Each generation must see themselves as recently released from slavery so that we will be able to recognize it when we see others whose lives are lived in bondage. The very act of recalling the story, the very act of retelling the story allows us to see more than just our release from Egyptian enslavement thousands of years ago; it invokes an awareness in us that true freedom for each and everyone in the world is possible in all times and places. We recall and we retell the story so that we may live and thrive in freedom.

*Chag Pesach Sameiach* – May the Holy One bring you joy and freedom.

## FROM THE TEMPLE GIFT SHOP

We all have mezuzahs on our doors. One of our artists designs mezuzahs and sent this information and I thought you might enjoy reading it.



In Hebrew, the word “mezuzah” literally means “doorpost”. The verse instructing us to hang a mezuzah reads, “You shall write these words upon the doorposts of your house and upon your gates.” Talmudic literature applied the term to the scroll affixed to the doorpost, which is how we still refer to it.

The Mezuzah is affixed to the right-hand side of the doorpost as you enter the room. For the front door, the right as you enter is always considered the right side. Inside the house, however, the right side is determined by which way the door opens. Whichever room the door opens into is considered the primary room, and the mezuzah is placed on the side that is on the right when entering that room.

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## ADD YOUR VOICE TO THE TALKING ARCHIVE

In 2020, the McCall Library began collecting interviews from members of Mobile’s Jewish community for preservation in the archives and to contribute to inter-communal understanding in the region. ## FROM OUR ARCHIVES

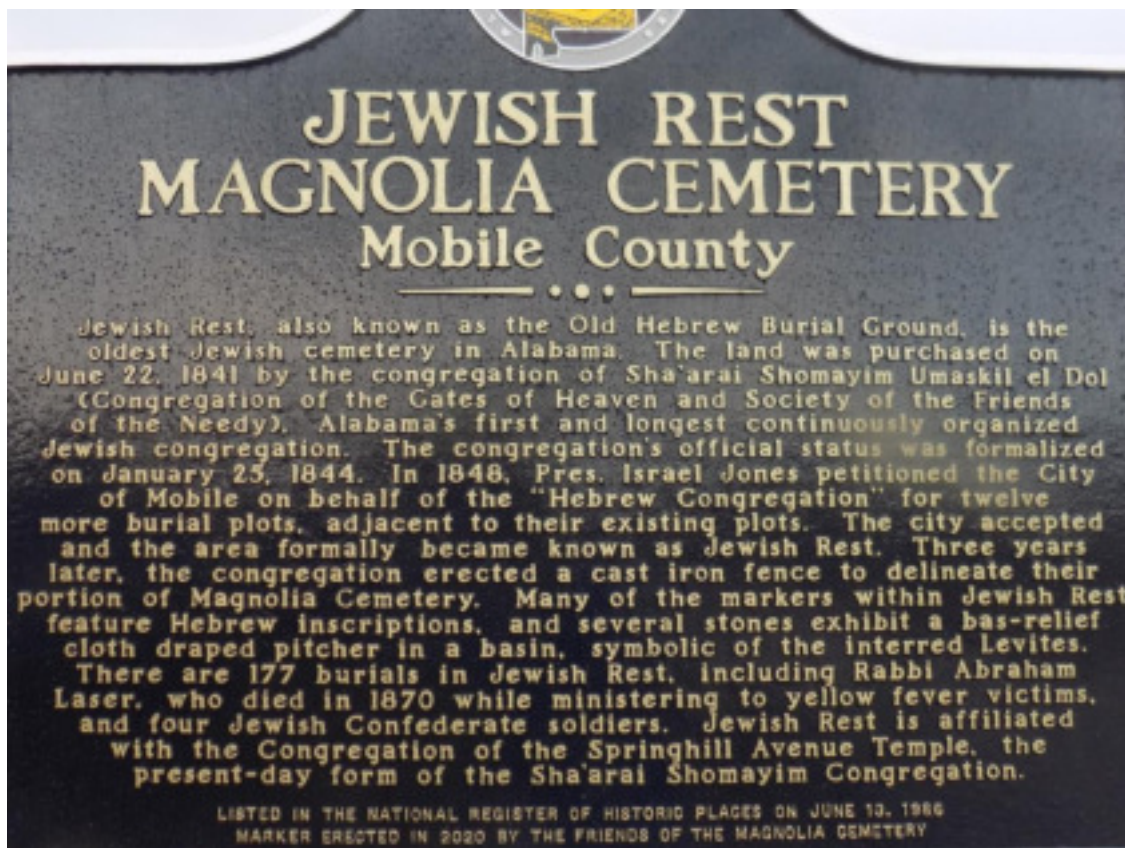
On January 30, 2021, several members of Springhill Avenue Temple, along with representatives of the Friends of Magnolia Cemetery, met to officially unveil a newly-erected plaque commemorating the Jewish Rest section of the cemetery as the oldest Jewish burying ground in Alabama. The plaque was issued by the Alabama Historical Commission through the Magnolia Cemetery Friends organization.

Jewish Rest, also called Old Hebrew Cemetery, the Hebrew Burial Ground, and the Old Hebrew Burial Ground, was founded in 1841 when a group of Jewish businessmen purchased a small plot within Mobile's "New Burying Ground," later known as Magnolia Cemetery. Three years later Sha'arai Shomayim would be officially incorporated. The congregation would add additional plots to the original purchase, eventually allowing room for 177 known burials. By 1875, Jewish Rest was full,

with no room for expansion. At that time, the congregation bought land for the current cemetery, across the street from Magnolia.

In 2017, the Friends of Magnolia Cemetery, with assistance from the Ben May Foundation, erected an iron fence around Jewish Rest, replacing the original one, which had been taken down in the early 1950s. Jewish Rest, along with all of Magnolia Cemetery, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Although designated as the oldest Jewish cemetery in the state, there are older Jewish burials in Mobile's Church Street Cemetery.

Congregant David Rose is currently serving on the Board of Directors of the Friends of Magnolia Cemetery and was instrumental in getting the plaque commissioned and installed. The unveiling ceremony coincided with the Temple's 177th anniversary.
