## FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Also in May, we observe Memorial Day as a nation to honor those brave Americans who gave their lives while in the service of our country. Jewish Americans have long served in the military, including, I must add with a sense of pride, my own late father who was in the Marine Corps for 9 years and was a combat veteran in World War II. Many Jews have received the Congressional Medal of Honor, the highest military decoration presented to a member of the armed services.

In the foyer near the front doors of our building there is a plaque to memorialize those congregants who died while in military service. See photo.

While it has not yet been set, please be on the lookout for the date of the annual meeting. The Nominating Committee, chaired by Nathan Handmacher, is at work to present a slate of officers and trustees. **OUR FIRST IN-PERSON SERVICE:  
WE ARE READY TO SEE YOU...BUT SAFELY**

We are excited that the Temple will open its doors to the Congregation on Friday, May 21, 2021, for our first in-person Shabbat Service since March, 2020. While we will not be able to hug yet, we can see another, (with masks and at a safe distance), and experience the spiritual uniqueness of being in the Sanctuary with our fellow congregants. Rabbi Kaplan will be leading us along with music provided by Christopher Powell and his team.

Please continue to wear masks (don't forget to cover your mouth and nose!) and observe social distancing. Services will be held in the Sanctuary rather than in the Chapel until further notice. As has been our custom, the service will begin at 6:15 pm. We will continue to provide the service via Zoom as well.

For the time being, seating will be limited to fifty (50) attendees. Within the sanctuary, certain rows will be roped off to allow for social distancing. Families may sit together but must be separated by three (3) seats from other families or individuals.

The use of the bathrooms will be limited to two (2) persons at any one time.

There will be no social gathering inside the Temple. (Again, sorry, but no hugging yet.) Likewise, there will be no Oneg or sharing of the Motzi Challah or the Kiddush Wine. Hopefully, this will change as the situation improves.

We are following guidelines put out by the CDC. We are grateful for your cooperation. We are monitoring those guidelines closely and will adapt and revise these rules accordingly.

On Sunday, April 18, we celebrated Israel's Memorial/Yom Ha'Zikaron and Independence/Yom Ha'Atzmaut Day via Zoom. We had good attendance from students and congregants. We learned about the customs and ceremonies in Israel by reading texts, singing songs, watching videos, and playing trivia games! We also learned a few Hebrew words. May next year's Memorial and Independence Day celebration be at the Temple!



On Sunday, April 25, we remembered the Holocaust. We watched a video of the music "I'm Still Alive". The video included a sing-a-long of Holocaust survivors with their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. We also watched a short 2-minute video of the nearly forgotten story of Nicholas Winton. Sir Nicholas Winton was a young Londoner enjoying the trappings of his budding career as a stockbroker when an unexpected encounter led him to eventually rescue 669 Jewish Czech and Slovak children just before the onset of WWII.

Great news! Meagan Furman's Bat Mitzvah is coming on Saturday, May 8, 2021 at 10:30 am, via Zoom.

Confirmation is also right around the corner and will be held on Friday, May 28, 2021. Wills Briskman, Meagan Furman, Ben Holberg, and Gabe Sternberg are ready to take the step to their commitment to Judaism. We will also observe Shavuot, which involves the passing the Torah from person to person. Both of these ceremonies often draw an explicit parallel between Israel's acceptance of the Torah and the teen's acceptance of adult Jewish obligations.

Religious School is almost over. Our last day this year will be Sunday, May 16, 2021.

Despite the many obstacles caused by the pandemic, Religious School is alive and well!!!

## FROM OUR ARCHIVES

Bernard H. Eichold served as President of the Temple from 1941-1943. After his tenure was complete, he compiled a sizeable number of documents related to his term in office and had them bound into a scrapbook. On the cover of the book is embossed in gold, "President's Papers 100 Year Government Street Temple" and in the lower corner, "B. H. Eichold President."

Eichold's collection of documents appear to mostly be arranged in chronological order. They include such items as financial audits, letters, lists of donors to various fund drives, announcements of meetings, committee reports, and relevant newspaper articles. Many of the items are related to the centenary celebration the congregation observed in 1944.

Associated with celebrating the Temple's 100th anniversary, a campaign was held to pay off the indebtedness of the building and to make improvements to the cemetery. This campaign was documented extensively in Eichold's scrapbook. In a letter to the congregation urging members to contribute to the Centenary Fund, he writes, "At such a critical time in the history of mankind, when all of us have so much at stake in the war between the forces of right and might, we know that our congregation will indicate, by a fitting response to this appeal, loyalty to God, reverence for the

generations gone by ... and a consciousness of the privilege of participating in the centenary celebration."

Eichold was successful in encouraging members to donate to the fund. In a letter to donors dated February 24, 1944, he writes, "Thank you for your splendid contribution to our Centenary Fund ... we have reached the goal which we set for ourselves. Surely your satisfaction must be great. You have shared in an effort that has immeasurably strengthened our congregation's financial position, at a time when our hearts glowed at the achievement of one century of continuous congregational worship and work."

Eleven years later Eichold is again raising funds, this time for the dedication service for the Temple's new building on Springhill Avenue. The scrapbook contains letters he received with contributions, notes regarding the dedication service, and a program from the 1955 annual meeting in which the dedication service is discussed.

Bernard Eichold was married to Myra Solomon and they had two children, Eva and Samuel. Bernard Eichold died in 1957, not long after he compiled his "President's Papers." The scrapbook gives a detailed glimpse into the duties of a Temple president. It can be read and examined in the Temple Archives.

## The Secret to Better Home Fries? Cook Them Like the French Do

Pommes persillade might *sound* fancy, but the homey side dish is incredibly easy to make at home. Crispy potatoes with soft, tender centers are tossed in melted butter, minced garlic, and fresh parsley to create the ultimate side dish. It's like the classic diner home fries you know and love, only elevated.

The trick to getting these potatoes super crispy is to boil them in salted water *before* pan-frying them. This does two things: **It cooks the potatoes all the way through so they are perfectly tender, and it helps bring some of the potatoes' gelatinized starches to the surface so the potatoes get nice and crispy.**



### Pommes Persillade

Yield: Serves 6 to 8; Prep Time: 15 minutes;

Cook Time: 25 minutes to 30 minutes

#### Ingredients

- 4 medium russet potatoes (about 1 1/2 pounds total)
- 1 tbsp plus 3/4 tsp kosher salt, divided
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1/2 bunch fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 1 oz Parmesan cheese, finely shredded (about 1/2 cup)
- 4 tbsp (1/2 stick) unsalted butter
- 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tbsp olive oil

#### Instructions

1. Peel and cut 4 medium russet potatoes into 1" cubes. Place potatoes in a large pot and add enough cold water to cover potatoes by 1". Stir in 1 tbsp of kosher salt. Cover and bring to a boil over high heat. Uncover and reduce heat to low to maintain a gentle simmer. Cook until potatoes are easily pierced with a knife but not falling apart, 12-14 minutes. Meanwhile, line a baking sheet with paper towels.
2. Drain the potatoes, transfer onto a baking sheet, and spread in a single layer. Pat the potatoes dry with more towels and let cool for 10 minutes. Meanwhile, mince 2 garlic cloves, coarsely chop the leaves from 1/2 bunch fresh parsley, and finely shred 1 oz. Parmesan cheese (about 1/2 cup). Microwave 4 tbsp unsalted butter in a large microwave-safe bowl until melted, about 30 seconds. Add the garlic, parsley, 1/2 tsp black pepper, and the remaining 3/4 tsp kosher salt, and stir to combine. Set aside.
3. Heat 2 tbsp olive oil in a 10" cast iron or nonstick skillet over medium-high heat until shimmering. Work in batches if needed, add the potatoes and cook, stirring and flipping them often, until golden-brown and crisp on all sides, 10 to 12 minutes total. Transfer the potatoes into the bowl of garlic butter and toss to coat. Transfer into a serving bowl and garnish with the Parmesan.
